Pine Mountain Community Welcomes Webb's Landing Sub-Station

PMVFD now has an operational sub-station at 750 MC 8010, located adjacent to the Webb's Landing Airstrip. The Webb's Landing Station has been designated by the Board as Station #3 for reference.

The 20 X 32 feet long building was purchased in kit form from US Steel and erected entirely by volunteers on land donated and deeded to the fire department by Webb Development Company through Orville Mears. An access road and parking area have also been cleared and gravelled for your convenience.

Station #3 now houses Truck #2 (Forestry Brush Truck, 750-gallon capacity).

Board Appoints New Trash Co-Ordinator

David Bernstein now looks after the PMVFD Trash Program. Marvin Sontag, our Vice President has decided to bow out of looking after the trash program in addition to his position as PMVFD Vice-President due to health issues. We wish to take this opportunity to thank Marvin Sontag for his years of service to the Pine Mountain Community.

Fire Chiefs Corner

During this past year, we dodged the bullet, or Providence seemed to shine on us. After we were warned of a potentially devastating fire season due to debris from the ice storm of 2009. We responded to only 6 fires, all grass/woodlands, all but one relatively minor. The lone fire with the potential of severe damage was in a canyon area without roads near the intersection of MC 8060 and MC 8088. Access for fire trucks was extremely limited and much of the active fire was outside the limits of our hose lengths. Fire fighting actions were conducted mostly with backpack water pumps and hand tools. With the very capable assistance of the Arkansas Forestry Commission personnel from Yellville and their earth moving equipment, we were able to contain and extinguish the fire in a few hours. From visual evidence at the scene, it appears that the fire may have been set by lightning. Based on info received a short time ago, over 30,000 acres were destroyed by wildfires in the state during 2010. 1,700 acres burned in the second week of November.

This past year saw some very significant improvements, especially in material readiness and training. The department was able to successfully apply for and receive three firefighter assistance grants, one through the Arkansas RC&D for \$3042, one from Arkansas Forestry Commission for \$1,000, and the other for \$7,500 from the Department of the Interior/National Park Service. These monies allowed us to procure much needed equipment and protective clothing, especially for grass/woods fire fighting that accounts for the vast majority of our fires.

Assistant Chief Ron Dana, a certified fire training officer, has continued his rather intensive training program for the firefighters. Courses that normally would be taught at the Arkansas Fire Academy or by AFA adjunct instructors are being taught by him on a regular basis at the Community Center. As a result, existing firefighters as well as new recruits receive valuable information and are more confident in their abilities to successfully and safely respond to a fire call.

Chief's Corner

Probably our most significant improvement was the completion of our third fire station, a one-bay station located near the hangar area on the airstrip at Webb's Landing. Although initial plans called for the station to be built primarily through donations, the Board of Directors ultimately approved the expenditure of fire department funds to complete the project. Truck No. 2, a forestry truck supplemented with portable equipment including a foam dispensing unit is now stationed there. The presence of 7 firefighters residing in Webb's Landing will ensure faster response times not only to that area but also to fires anywhere in the district. For those members still desiring to help offset construction costs, tax deductible donations are still welcome and can be submitted to the treasurer. Receipts will be provided .

We completed outfitting a 3,000-gallon tanker truck with the addition of a baffled water tank purchased from a local equipment supplier that was placed on a dump truck chassis procured through the DOD. One of the above grants was used to purchase a 3000-gallon folding drop tank to be used with the new tanker.

Volunteers Needed

The Pine Mountain Volunteer Fire department is a non-profit corporation established under Section 501 (c)(3) if the Internal Revenue Code. The Board of Directors, firefighters, medical first responders, trash haulers and fund raisers are all volunteers who go about the business of the corporation day after day, week after week in the hopes that their efforts will benefit all of its members. The Pine Mountain Community is a community built on volunteerism, whether it be as a firefighter, first responder, a member of the Board of Directors, a trash hauler, someone ready to clean up the cemetery for the annual reunion, or part of a team that picks up trash along the district's roadways once or twice a year.

Volunteerism is a way of life here and all are welcome to participate. There is something for everyone to participate in. Becoming a consistent attendee at the regularly scheduled Board meetings is also a way of volunteering. Over the past several years, there has been a noticeable decrease in the numbers of members attending the meetings of the Board of Directors. These meetings are open to the public and attendance is encouraged. The business of the Board is the business of the community and input from all members is important to preserving the vitality of the corporation. Please take the time and make the effort to attend these meetings that are scheduled for the third Wednesday of January, April, July with the annual members' meeting held on the third Wednesday in October. Your inputs and suggestions will be well received and given due consideration.

With respect to the activities of the fire department, the following information is pertinent.. The PMVFD currently consists of about 15 certified firefighters, 5 others in training, and 5 Basic Life Support First Responders. We operate 1 municipal style pumper truck, 2 tankers, 2 wildland fire trucks, a rapid response brush truck, a rescue vehicle and a service truck. Our main station is next to the Community Center on MC 8004, Station 2 is located on MC 8059, and we recently completed construction of a third station at the airstrip in Webb's Landing. However, as with many volunteer organizations, especially one with a largely aging population, we

suffer from a lack of new volunteers to replace retiring members and those moving out of area. We are constantly recruiting new members, asking them to give some of their free time to better serve the community as a volunteer firefighter or medical first responder.

You are, no doubt, asking yourself – What does it take to be a volunteer firefighter?

First of all, you must have the desire to be a volunteer, ready to give up some of your personal time to attend courses of instruction, business meetings, training sessions and, of course, respond to fire calls day or night. It is also very important that your overall health be adequate for you to perform duties required of you. Not all firefighters will be called on to enter burning buildings, but may be required to drive, operate apparatus or control traffic. No one will be asked to do anything he or she is not comfortable in performing.

If you are willing to sacrifice some of your time and are considering volunteering as a firefighter, the basic requirements to become a certified firefighter, and thus covered by Workman's Compensation, are to satisfactorily complete the following courses of instruction:

- 1 Introduction to Firefighting (12 hrs.)
- 2 Personal Protection Equipment (12 hrs.)
- 3 Wildland Firefighting (8 hrs.)

Also, FEMA requires all firefighters and first responders to complete two (2) on line courses as follows:

1. (IS700a) National Incident Management System (NIMS) (3 hrs.)
2. (ICS-100a) Incident Command System (3 hrs.)

The total time required to complete all of the above is approximately 36 hours usually spread over many dates and times. All but the Wildland Firefighting course are taught by our Certified Training Officer at the Community Center, usually following the monthly business meeting. Once certified, firefighters must receive an additional 16 hours of

Preparing For Emergencies

Emergencies can occur at any time and without warning. They can come in the form of tornadoes, violent thunderstorms, winter storms, earthquakes, and remnants of hurricanes or tropical storms. Everyone should prepare for such events in advance to lessen confusion and undue stress in the aftermath of an unexpected event.

The first step starts with the family discussing and deciding on a meeting place in the event of rapid exit from a house fire or evacuation ordered by authorities.

Next, everyone should have an emergency kit readily available. Supplies should be adequate to last a minimum of three days and should include:

- * One (1) gallon of water per person per day. Store water in clean plastic or fiberglass containers. Do not use glass or other breakable containers.
- * Stock foods that do not need refrigeration and little or no water to prepare, such as ready-to-eat canned meats, fruits and vegetables, canned milk and juices, peanut butter, granola bars, crackers, etc. If you have an infant, stock formula and baby food. Don't forget your pet, if you have one.
- * Third, have an adequate supply of hygiene supplies. This should include soap, toilet paper and paper towels, trash bags, toothpaste and brushes, shampoo and deodorant, feminine supplies, comb and brush, disinfectant and common household bleach.

* Fourth, prepare a toolbox with common tools such as:

- Non-electric can opener
- Cups, plates and utensils
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- Battery powered radio and extra batteries
- Plastic sheeting and duct tape
- Pliers
- Scissors
- Needles and thread
- Paper and pencils
- Blankets and sleeping bags

Change of clothes

Emergency cash or travelers checks

Important family documents,

including IDs, Social Security cards, passports, birth, marriage and death certificates, credit cards, record of bank accounts, insurance policies, wills, contracts and deeds, etc.

Anything else deemed important by family members

* Last, but very important, all homes should have a well-stocked first aid kit. A basic kit should include:

A first aid manual

Bandages, including sterile bandages and gauze pads of varying sizes, adhesive tape and elastic bandages for sprains, etc.

Non-prescription medicines such as aspirin or non-aspirin pain relievers, cough syrup, antihistamine tablets, decongestant tablets, antacid, etc.

Prescription medications

Other supplies, including a thermometer, alcohol wipes, iodine or hydrogen peroxide, sting and bite ointments, antibiotic ointment, disposable gloves, cotton balls and a list of family allergies and prescription medications.

Hello Pine Mountain Residents. This year we have seen a few more calls than the last two phenomenal years. The good thing about the calls is that we always have good response from your 1st responder medical team. They do an excellent job. We also want to give the the fire fighters a great big Thank You also. They have been showing up to assist the responders. On many of the calls they show up to assist by leading in the ambulance, assisting with the Air Evac crew, and helping in any way they can. Their help is very much appreciated. The fire chief Dick Quinn and his assistant Ron Dana have done an excellent job of training and getting everyone working together as a team.

The personal oxygen tanks that you helped us purchase a couple of years ago, continue to be utilized as they were intended. They are working out well.

If you have an emergency all you have to do is call 911 and the dispatcher will call for either the Pine Mountain First Responders or the Fire Fighters and Rescue team to respond, depending on the nature of the emergency. In the event of an emergency rescue, (such as a motor vehicle accident etc.) all will respond.

We are always in need of more 1st responders. If you would like to volunteer please contact either myself, Harlan Ackerson 436-2795 or Betsy Mizanin 436-3583. We would like to set up a training session for at least four new Responders during the year 2011.

My older sister passed away recently of a heart attack. Bless her, she was such a great sister and friend to everyone that she met. But the reason I mention this is that the symptoms for a heart attack for the female gender is different than for the males. And we are all familiar with the symptoms for the men. My sister had a couple teeth pulled on Wednesday and was doing fine until Saturday. Then she had this terrible jaw ache and thinking it was from her dental work she ignored it all day. She passed away around 5:00 the evening. A jaw ache is one of the symptoms of a heart attack for females. This time it was disguised and so she apparently was

having a heart attack all day and did not realize it. So I am including an article for the American Legion Magazine, given to me by Jeanine Peyton.

The Gender Gap on Heart Attacks.

Women who have severe heart attacks are twice as likely to die as men according to a study reported in the Journal Circulation. That's in part because women are less likely to experience chest pain or pressure and medical personnel don't recognize their symptoms quickly enough.

The study also revealed that women are less likely to receive aspirin or beta blocker in the emergency room, or undergo emergency procedures to restore blood flow to the heart.

Although women may not experience chest pain or discomfort, they are more likely than men to have other heart attack symptoms. The American Heart Association says women should be alert to these signs:

- * Discomfort or pain in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back.

- * Discomfort or pain in the back, neck, JAW, arms or stomach.

- * Shortness of breath.

- * Nausea, lightheadedness, or breaking out in a cold sweat.

Anyone with these symptoms shouldn't wait more than five minutes before calling 911.

Trash News

Over the past year, Marion County has changed the way in which they operate their Trash Program. PMVFD has been forced to change how we operate our Trash Program in order to comply with new procedures mandated by Marion County.

Pine Mountain VFD Trash Program Procedures

Members must get their own permits in person from the Marion County Transfer Station at the corner of Hwy #62 and Hwy #202 in Yellville. For more information, you can call them at (870) 449-5501.

When you go to the Transfer Station, bring evidence that you live in Marion County and a check or cash in the amount of \$32.10 for an annual permit. If you want two permit cards, give them the names of two residents in the household. There is no extra charge for the second card.

MAKE SURE YOU TELL THEM THAT YOU PARTICIPATE IN THE PINE MOUNTAIN TRASH PROGRAM.

After you get your permit, please deliver a check for your trash hauling dues (\$36.00/yr) to the PMVFD, either in the drop box at the Community Center or by mail to:

With your trash dues, please enclose either the original or a copy of the receipt you get from the Transfer Station so we can enter your name, permit number and issue date into our records.

Remember, your trash dues are due each year when you renew your permit, but your fire department dues are due January 1st.

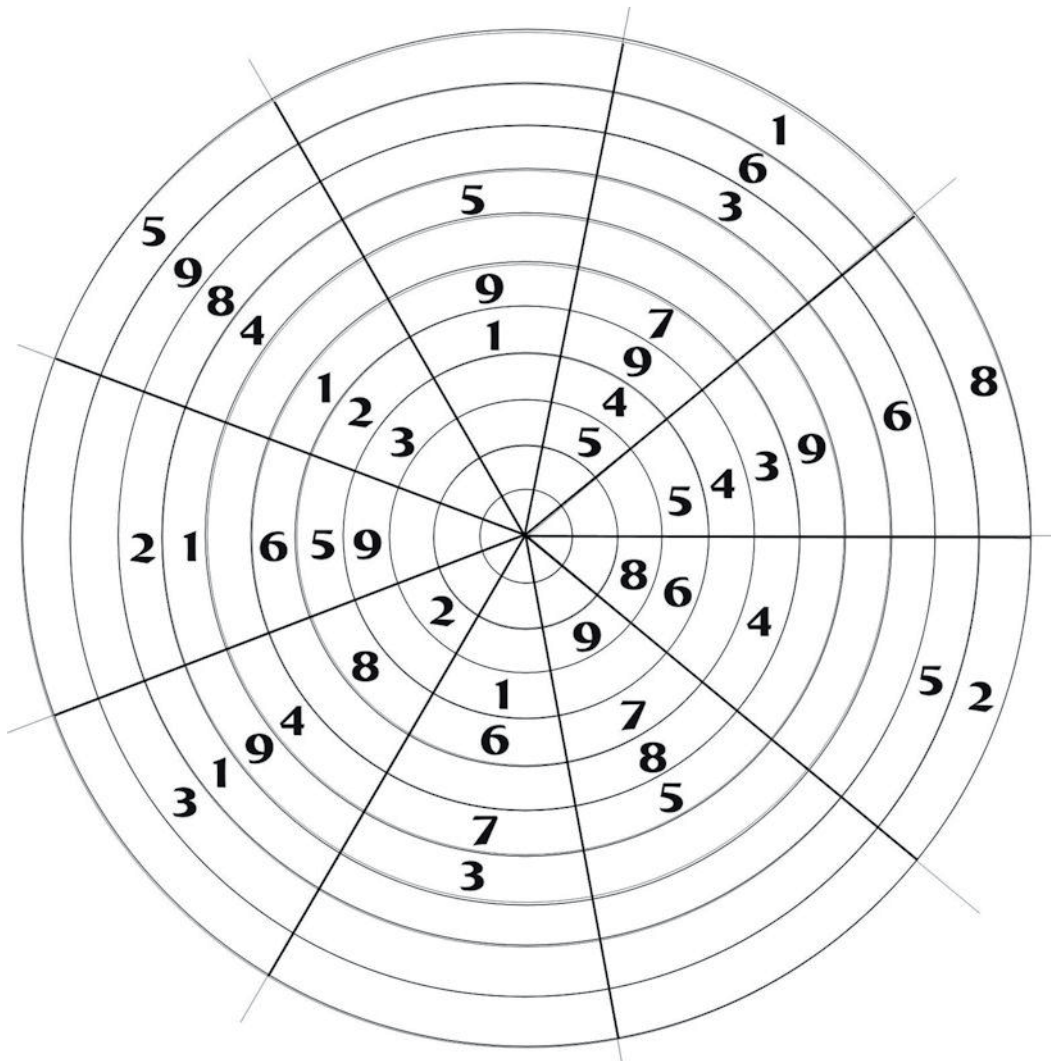

Burning Yard Waste In Arkansas

The old burn barrel should be a thing of the past. However, most residents own and operate a burn barrel on their property. Every barrel should have a screen cover, holes at the bottom for a draft, and a wide fire line around it. Also, when burning, make sure it is legal, there is no better way to dispose of the material, there is water and a shovel readily available and you have a fire line around the material to be burned. But, what is allowed to be burned? The following information is taken from the ADEQ Air Division Compliance Monitoring Division and is paraphrased here for purposes of brevity.

Under provisions of Act 1151 of 1997, the open burning of yard waste is strongly discouraged, but permissible, and can be limited. Local officials can place local restrictions on open burning, such as setting up permit procedures, prior to burning yard waste. Under the law, yard waste is defined as grass clippings, leaves and shrubbery trimmings collected from residential property, but remember, it is against the law to burn household waste.

Burning can be stopped when the county judge issues a county wide burn ban. Additionally, under Act 1151, open burning can be prohibited statewide or in a particular area of the state when it becomes a public nuisance, creates a fire or safety hazard, or it pollutes the air and ADEQ believes it will create a situation whereby the National Ambient Air Quality Standards could be exceeded.

State and local officials can stop a citizen from burning yard waste. Complaints about air pollution caused by open burning of yard waste should be filed with the ADEQ. (The local Air Division Inspector is Doug Ogburn in Mountain Home and can be reached at 870-424-3335). Nuisance, fire and safety complaints should be filed with the local fire or police department or sheriff's office.

If state and local officials find that open burning of yard waste is a persistent offense to neighbors, a fire hazard to surrounding property, or a safety hazard, then state and/or local officials can take steps to ensure the fire is extinguished and possibly issue a ticket or a fine.
